Don't forget we have a Facebook page! This is a great way to showcase your orchids between meetings.


Let's face it, our beautiful orchids don't always make an appearance at the right time for meetings. Post your orchids on Facebook so we can all admire them.

Dealing With An Overgrown Cattleya

A novice grower recently noted that she would very much like to know how to divide and repot an overgrown cattleya so I decided to look on the internet to see whether there were any sites to which I could refer her.

I searched 'repotting an overgrown cattleya' and watched three YouTube videos: one of 14 minutes 25, the second 20 mins 15 and the third 30 mins 36. I could not recommend any of them. My main concerns were:

that two out of the three large plants were potted on although they consisted mostly of pseudobulbs that had already flowered and would not flower again. The third plant was divided but, again, none of the old pseudobulbs were removed and two huge divisions were jammed into one pot.

in all cases the repotted orchids were left with a mass of mostly old roots that were jammed into the pot. These were the roots from the old flowered pseudobulbs that will inevitably die and create a soggy mass in the new media. There was almost no space for new roots that will come from and support the new leads as they grow.

I didn't think I had a candidate for a demonstration but I noticed my overgrown *Laelia speciosa* was making new growths and they had new roots starting to emerge so it is clearly the right time to repot/divide this orchid. This orchid flowers from the new leads when they are quite immature so it is also in bud. Generally, the advice is not to interfere with an orchid that is flowering but the decision here is, "Do I sacrifice these flowers and repot at the optimum time or do I let it flower and then repot, risking the roots being broken or not taking to the new media thus endangering the longer term viability of the plant. To me this is a no brainer as I don't want to lose it and, as this one usually flowers twice a year, I won't have long to wait.

Picture 1: Laelia speciosa. It was last repotted in September 2019 and the info on the tag said it had good roots at that time.

Picture 2: This is a section of the plant showing two of the new growths and the tiny new root forming at the base of the new growth. It has about 8 new growths spread out around the pot.

Picture 3: Here it is out of the pot and the roots and media exposed. The roots do not look very healthy and the media which was bark and stones with diatomite is breaking down. Some of my orchids responded well to the addition of diatomite but the last lot I bought just dissolved and turned gluggy in the pots so I stopped using it. This orchid clearly did not like it.

Picture 4: Remove all old media and separate the roots. I use a pointed wooden skewer to do this to loosen the roots and dislodge the old bark, etc. The better you separate the roots at this stage the easier it will be to divide the plant without further root damage. You can see quite a lot of leafless backbulbs on this plant. They will be removed as the divisions are tidied up.

Picture 5: At this stage it should be possible to see where the plant can be divided and this one has a line roughly through the middle of the plant so I firmly grasp each side taking care not to harm the new growths and gently tug and twist until the two pieces separate. If necessary you may have to cut through the rhizome but I prefer to break them if possible.

Picture 6 shows the two halves. Now I start to trim the dead and broken roots, cut off any old flower spikes and clean off any dry husks around the old pseudobulbs. This plant had two awkwardly placed small side sections which I removed; one has two new leads and the other has an eye which should develop into a new lead. Divisions should have at least 3-4 backbulbs along with the leading growth.

Picture 7: Here are the four divisions along with also two sets of three rootless backbulbs that I will put into some water to see whether they develop a new growth. As you can see, I have removed most of the roots but the new roots that will come from the new growths are what will sustain the plant.

Picture 8: Here are the 4 plants potted up along with the two lots of backbulbs. The two biggest plants have several new leads apiece. They still had their flowers on in this photo but these were removed before they were moved into the shadehouse so that all of the plant's energy could be devoted to growing some good sized pseudobulbs and lots of strong roots. They are potted in 9-12mm Orchiata bark with perlite into a pot just large enough to accommodate one or two years of new growths. Each one also has a sprinkle of slow release fertiliser and a tiny pinch of BugKilla to ward off any insect pests. They have been given a drink of Plant Starter and placed in a sheltered, shady position in the shadehouse. They will be kept just moist until the new roots establish.

















Cattleyas are sympodial orchids which means they have a **stem** which is called a **rhizome** that grows close to the ground. From this low-growing stem sprout **pseudobulbs**, one growing from the base of the previous one so the last one will produce the next flowering growth. Some orchids have branching rhizomes so you can get multiple new growths but many just have a single lead. If a plant has a lot of spent pseudobulbs in the middle and some new leads on the outside then it is time to divide and get rid of the unproductive backbulbs to make more compact, productive plants.

We encourage you to support them.
